NOTE—The Company's charge, except upon ordinary live stock, is dependent upon the value of the property, as declared or released by the shipper. If the shipper desires to release the value to \$50 for any shipment of 100 pounds or less, or not exceeding fifty cents per pound, actual weight, for any shipment in excess of 100 pounds, the value may be released by inserting "not exceeding \$50," or "not exceeding fifty cents per pound," in which case the company's liability is limited to an amount not exceeding the value so declared or released.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

1. The provisions of this receipt shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the consignee, the consignee, and all carriers handling this shipment, and shall apply to any re-shipment, or return thereof.

2. In consideration of the rate charged for carrying said property, which is dependent upon the value thereof and is based upon an agreed valuation of not exceeding fifty dollars for any shipment of 100 pounds or less, and not exceeding five cents per pound, actual weight, for any shipment in excess of 100 pounds, unless a greater value is declared at the time of shipment, the shipper agrees that the company shall not be liable in any event for more than fifty dollars for any shipment of 100 pounds or less, or for more than five cents per pound, actual weight, for any shipment weighing more than 100 pounds, unless a greater value is stated herein. Unless a greater value is declared and stated herein the shipper agrees that the value of the shipment is as last above set out and that the liability of the company shall in no event exceed such value.

3. Unless caused by its own negligence or that of its agents, the company shall not be liable for—

- a. Difference in weight or quantity caused by shrinkage, leakage, or evaporation.
- b. The death, injury, or escape of live freight.
- c. Loss of money, bullion, bonds, coupons, jewelry, precious stones, valuable papers, or other matter of extraordinary value, unless such articles are enumerated in the receipt.

4. Unless caused in whole or in part by its own negligence or that of its agents, the company shall not be liable for loss, damage, or delay caused by—

- a. The act or default of the shipper or owner.
- b. The nature of the property, or defect or inherent vice therein.
- c. Improper or insufficient packing, securing, or addressing.
- d. The Act of God, public enemies, authority of law, quarantine, riots, strikes, perils of navigation, the hazards or dangers incident to a state of war, or occurrence in customs warehouse.
- e. The examination by, or partial delivery to, the consignee of C. O. D. shipments.
- f. Delivery under instructions of consignee or consignee at stations where there is no agent of the company after such shipments have been left at such stations.

5. Packages containing fragile articles or articles consisting wholly or in part of glass shall be so marked and be packed so as to insure safe transportation by express with ordinary care.

6. When property is destined to a point at which no express company has an agency it

should be marked with the name of the express station at which delivery will be accepted. If not so marked it will be carried to the express station nearest the destination point and arrival notice given consignee.

7. Except where the loss, damage, or injury complained of is due to delay or damage while being loaded or unloaded, or damaged in transit by carelessness or negligence, no conditions precedent to recovery claims must be made in writing to the originating or delivering carrier within four months after delivery of the property or, in case of failure to make delivery, then within four months after a reasonable time for delivery has elapsed; and suits for loss, damage, or delay shall be instituted only within two years and one day after delivery of the property or, in case of failure to make delivery, then within two years and one day after a reasonable time for delivery has elapsed.

8. If any C. O. D. is not paid within thirty days after notice of non-delivery has been mailed to the shipper the Company may at its option return the property to the consignor.

9. Free delivery will not be made at points where the company maintains no delivery service; at points where delivery service is maintained free delivery will not be made at addresses beyond the established and published delivery limits.

Special Additional Provisions as to Shipments Forwarded from the United States to Places in Foreign Countries.

10. If the destination specified on this receipt is in a foreign country, the property covered hereby shall, as to transit over ocean routes and by these foreign connections to such destination, be subject to all the terms and conditions of the receipts or bills of lading of ocean carriers as accepted by the company for the shipment, and of foreign carriers participating in the transportation, and as to such transit is accepted for transportation and delivery subject to the acts, orders, laws, regulations, and customs of over-sea and foreign carriers, custodians, and governments, their employees and agents.

11. The Company shall not be liable for any loss, damage, or delay to said shipments over ocean routes and their foreign connections, the destination of which is in a foreign country, occurring outside the boundaries of the United States, which may be occasioned by any such acts, orders, laws, regulations, or customs.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Francis Ojibway, a $\frac{1}{4}$ blood Chippewa, 18 years of age, passed his examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this school in ~~carpentry~~ under the old course of study.

Francis is the son of John B. and Annie M. Ojibway of Cloquet, Minn. His father is a Government farmer and both parents have a fair education.

Superintendent Cross reports that Francis has no land whatsoever, having been too young to be allotted under the act of January 14, 1889.

Principal Blair and Roy H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, report that Francis is a manly boy, clever, ambitious to rise in the world and to do something worth while. He is good in all English branches and has a good memory for facts and reasons well. He has a very quick temper but controls it admirably. In a case of discipline in which he is involved one can always appeal to his ~~sense of~~ justice to do the right thing. He is careless and is inclined to take his duties lightly. He has had two satis-

factory years in the carpenter shop. He has a happy disposition and sterling qualities of mind that win respect and confidence. His health is good and he is careful in spending money.

In view of these facts it would seem that Francis is amply able to manage his own affairs and should he, in the future, derive any interests in any property subject to Government control, I would recommend that any restrictions upon his person be removed as soon as it can legally be done.

Dear Mr. Cross:

Upon receipt of your favor of the 14th instant, in regard to a complaint that has been made by Francis Ojibway to the effect that he cannot take the work here he desired to get, I had inquiry made and learned that in school Francis has made but very ordinary marks. In his industrial work he started off so well that our newly appointed Director of Mechanic Arts took special interest in him with a view of preparing him for selection to take a course of work in the Cadillac Motor Car Company's establishment in Detroit, Michigan. The place would have given the young man a splendid opportunity to do good work and to prepare for a position very much better than is ordinarily obtained by Indian young men regardless of their training. However, you will readily see that if Francis is not willing to take the work that can be given here that nothing can be done for him.

I have also learned that the probable reason for the young man's complaint about the lack of facilities for learn-

ing a trade at this school is the fact that his father has been writing to him about a position he could get as fireman at the newly built hospital under your jurisdiction. If the father's idea of what constitutes a good position for his son is what he has in mind and Francis is willing to give up the chance he has here to prepare himself for something better than a laborer's job no objection to his going home will be interposed if he can provide the amount that will be required to pay for his transportation. I would have to insist, however, that he reimburse the government for the amount that had to be expended to bring him to Carlisle.

Will you let me hear in what other way I can cooperate with you in the matter?

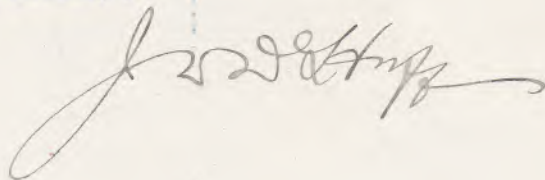

Mr. Meyer:-

Ojibway is enrolled in the highest class we have in the school. If he did work in advance of that before he came here, that is not our fault. I do not know that he did. He brought no statement of work previously done. I took his word for it that he had finished Grade VIII (common branches) and assigned him to First Year Vocational secondary and he chose the Mechanic Arts Course. His marks for the first term were English 91, Vocational Arithmetic 78, Agriculture (as substitute for drawing) 70. His marks in Arithmetic and Agriculture were not startlingly high, it will be observed. Class is now taking vocational algebra and next term will take geometry.

I have given him credit for our required work in object drawing and I assigned him to the work in carpentry, which he had not had. Neither had he had painting and blacksmithing. In fact, no vocational work of any sort had he done before coming here. I think he will find enough to keep him busy here, if he will just look for it.

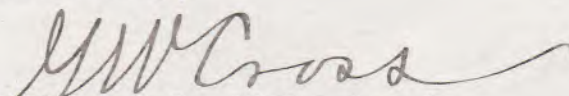
Dear Mr. Lipps:-

I was under the impression that Carlisle was one of the most advanced schools in the service, and that the facilities there for learning a trade were as good as anywhere.

Will you kindly call this boy into your office and talk the matter over with him and find out what is wrong, then advise me.

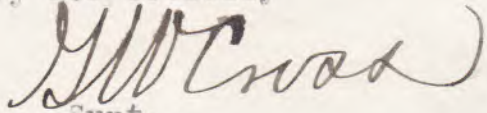

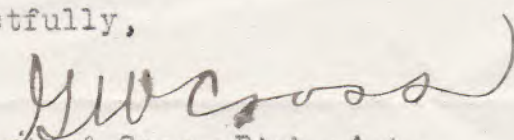

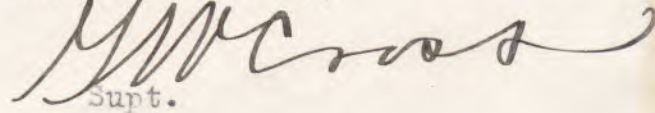
