## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:
That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child, Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that-
A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

If the pupil neglecting to return is from a reservation, the superintendent of the reservation shall certify to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils. If a pupil's home is not on a reservation, then the certificate of some reputable, disinterested citizen of the community may be requested as to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils.

Hy dear Iar. Irvine:
I am in receipt of your letter dated August 16,1917 in which you request me to recomend a first class Indian boy who would be an appropriate beneficiary for a scholarship to be given by Mr. Rodman W. Wanamaker at Mercersburg and at Princeton.

Ralph Tourtillotte was a member of our graduating class last year. He comes from Neopit, Wis. , and is a bright, reliable lad 18 years of age. I have this day telegraphed him to adyise me if he would acoopt thines scholarship if you would give it to him. It is necessary for me to do this beeause $I$ am not sure of what plans the lad has made for his future. If he cannot accept this splenaid opportunity I think I shall suggest Francis 0jinway.

The informetion on the application for admission will be given just as soon as I can determine whether the candidate will accept. Some of our Indian hoys are rather strange at times and would not jump at a wonderful opportunity of this kind as the average whi te boy would.

I am sending you, under separate cover, a copy of our Year Book. You will find a picture of Ralph at the top of page 17. You will note that he does not show his Indian blood to a great extent. Mrancis Ojibway's pioture is found at the top of page 19. There are other splendia fellows in the claje, but many of them have enlisted or have taizen up the Ford course. Often times, too, they lack in mental ability to pursee a course as out1ined.

Dear Superintendent:
As you probably know, <compat>I.r. Rodin \#. Wanamaker of Philadelphia is educating several Indian boys at llercersburg with the idea of having them prepared to take a course at Princeton University. Mr. Charles W. MoGilberry of Hartshorne, Oklahoma, a member of the Choctaw Tribe, has been a student with use during the past three years and has had the use of a Manamaker scholarship. Ur. WcGilberry has passed his examinations for entrance to Princeton and had expoctod to be orrolled in that University this fall. He has been drafted and, in all probability, will enter the army within the next few weeks. This means that his course at Princeton will be deferred until the close of the war.

Mr. Wanamaker wishes me to select another Indian boy to take the place of Mr. Hecilberry dur ing the next year or two. If this new candidate makes a good record,lir. Wanamaker will gladly support him not only through Lercersburg but also through Princeton. We already have three Indian bays selected for the coming year but we should like to have the fourth boy enter Hercersburg at the opening of fur fall term on Wednesday, September 19. The time is short. Can you recommend a first class Indian boy who would like to be a beneficiary on this scholarship? We want a boy of excellent character and first class mental ability. It is Lir. Wanamaker's idea that these boys shall finish their education and then return to our western country where they can be of service to the people of their own tribes. Ir . Wanamaker believes that Indian boys are bright enough to take advantage of a higher education and his purpose in sending these boys to Tlercersburg and Princeton is to prove his belief.

Please send full credentials and best records of each candidate. Also fill out enclosed blank for boy you may nominate.
