School Physician.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats.,

p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Reference is made to your letter of April, 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian Students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Ralph Tourtillott, a 4 blood Menominee Indian, 17 years of age, passed his examinations and on May 24, 1917 was graduated from this school in Engineer, in accordance with the Special course of study.

Ralph is the son of Charles William and Mary Ann Kruegar Tourtillott of Lily, Wisconsin. Both parents have a fair education. He worked on a farm a year before coming to Carlisle. Since coming here he has worked in the carpenter shop, engineering shop, masonry, painting, etc. He wishes to continue his education in some High School.

Principal Blair and Director of Mechanic Arts Bradley reports that Rapph is a bright boy who learns easily, not especially studious but fairly steady in application; he needs to be where there is plenty of competition in order to develope as he should. He is not as ambitious as he might be nor as several other members of the graduating class. Still he has aspirations and longings to be something more than an ordinary workingman. He is thinking of electrical translations while both a ferestry service. He is like to toward things in general. He has spent one year in the plumbing shop here. He is quite young and needs advise although he has the making of an excellent man in him.

I must apologize for not writting sooner.

I arrived home Saturday morning. Everything has been running nicely except the weather. It has rained nearly every day and is rather cold. 1

Tuesday I went to Shawano and drilled with the Meopit Rifle Club, and I must say that they were certainly "BUN". They have drilled for three years and yet they drill like men who have trained for three or four weeks. It is not their fault entirely, because they do not have a competent instructor.

Shawano has raised a company of National Guards and it will leave for training camp on the 15th of this month. The war spirit out here is very much the same as it is out east. Once in awhile someone says something in favor of Germany but one who says such things does not last very long.

I am glad to say that I have made use of some of my knowledge gained at Carlisle, already. I see no reason for not using more of it soon. I see now how much I really lar learned while at school.

I must close now hoping to be remembered to all.

This is a marvellous opportunity and if the boy can possible accept the same, I hope that he will send his blank filled out in the regular order. We do not want him, however, to accept the use of the scholarship and then after a year or two find out that family conditions compel him to withdraw from school. That would be a calamity and would be very provoking to Mr. Wanamaker.

I am in receipt of your letter dated August 16, 1917 in which you request me to recommend a first class Indian boy who would be an appropriate beneficiary for a scholarship to be given by Mr. Rodman W. Wanamaker at Mercersburg and at Princeton.

Ralph Tourtillotte was a member of our graduating class last year. He comes from Neopit, Wis., and is a bright, reliable lad 18 years of age. I have this day telegraphed him to advise me if he would accept this scholarship if you would give it to him. It is necessary for me to do this because I am not sure of what plans the led has made for his future. If he cannot accept this splendid opportunity I think I shall suggest Francis Ojibway.

The information on the application for admission will be given just as soon as I can determine whether the candidate will accept. Some of our Indian boys are rather strange at times and would not jump at a wonderful opportunity of this kind as the average white boy would.

Often times, too, they lack in mental ability to pursue a course as outlined.

As you probably know, Mr. Rodman W. Wanamaker of Philadelphia is educating several Indian boys at Mercersburg with the idea of having them prepared to take a course at Princeton University. Mr. Charles W. McGilberry of Hartshorne, Oklahoma, a member of the Choctaw Tribe, has been a student with us during the past three years and has had the use of a Wanamaker scholarship. Mr. McGilberry has passed his examinations for entrance to Princeton and had expected to be enrolled in that University this fall. He has been drafted and, in all probability, will enter the army within the next few weeks. This means that his course at Princeton will be deferred until the close of the war.

Mr. Wanamaker wishes me to select another Indian boy to take the place of Mr. McGilberry during the next year or two. If this new candidate makes a good record, Mr. Wanamaker will gladly support him not only through Hercersburg but also through Princeton. We already have three Indian boys selected for the coming year but we should like to have the fourth boy enter Mercersburg at the opening of our fall term on Wednesday, September 19. The time is short. Can you recommend a first class Indian boy who would like to be a beneficiary on this scholarship? We want a boy of excellent character and first class mental ability. It is Mr. Wanamaker's idea that these boys shall finish their education and then return to our western country where they can be of service to the people of their own tribes. Mr. Wanamaker believes that Indian boys are beight enough to take advantage of a higher education and his purpose in sending these boys to Mercersburg and Princeton is to prove his belief.

Please send full credentials and best records of each candidate. Also fill out enclosed blank for boy you may nominate.
