## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.*—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Sir:

Enclosed is a copy of a letter forwarded to Alex Roy at his outing home near New Hope, Pa. It is a decided pleasure to hear of this good report of Alex. I believed that the boy was a good chap and should be helped. Shortly before he went to Carlisle he was indicted in the Municipal Court for forging a town order for \$20, but I pleaded with the Judge to permit me to send him to a boarding school rather than to the reformatory, holding myself responsible for his good conduct for one year, which was the period he was to be sent to the house of correction, and you can, therefore, appreciate the degree of pleasure I experienced in receiving the kind of letter which you sent to Alex, and his letter to me.

There is one item that Alex has probably forgotten, that is, to pay his mother the amount of the note which she paid in order to have the amount refunded to the local bank. She is in need of funds, particularly if she does not succeed in selling her piece of land which she has up for sale. Perhaps Alex could pay off this amount some time this winter if he again goes on the outing system.

I felt at the time that Alex was in trouble here that he was influenced by one of the boys in the neighborhood, and I believe that his later actions have shown that my judgment was probably correct.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Alexander Roy, a 3/4 blood Chippewa, 17 years of age, passed his examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this school in carpentry in accordance with the old course of study.

Alex is the son of Frank Joseph and Lizzie Sharlow Roy of Bayfield, Wis. His father is dead. He claims to own 120 acres of land.

Superintendent J. W. Dady reports with reference to Alex and says that he has no funds in the agency office there nor does he own an allotment. His father's allotment went to his mother by will and his mother is still living. Mr. Dady reports that before going to Carlisle Alex was apparently a normal Indian Reservation boy. Just before being sent to Carlisle he forged a town order and he and another boy secured the money from the order from a local bank. At the time that Alex did this he was attending school and the teacher was giving the class, which he was attending, lessons in drawing checks, drafts, etc. His father being town clerk he obtained the blank town order. It was at first determined to send him to a house of correction, but later he was sent to Carlisle.

The wisdom of this action is shown by the statement of Principal Blair and Mr. R.H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, Alex Roy is intelligent, steady, and very satisfactory in his academic work. He has initiative and self-confidence without being conceited. He likes competition and does his best to keep ahead of the other fellow. If it is not necessary for him to put forth much effort, he is lazy and usually does as well as he has to do. He is a "good fellow" but not yielding. He is a level headed chap with ambitions.

Alex's health is good. He is careful in spending money.

In view of all the facts in connection with his case, should there be any restrictions upon the person of Alex Roy, or should he in the future receive property subject to Government restrictions, they should be promptly removed as he is amply able to manage his own affairs.




