This is to call your attention to the fact that the tuition for your son, Jesse Wofford, has been in arrears since the 11th of this month, and that it is absolutely necessary that the matter be adjusted without delay.

I should like to see Jesse remain here at Carlisle, but he cannot be kept in school unless his tuition is paid for at least one month. An amount of \$13.92 will be required for one month's tuition. An amount of \$41.75 will pay for his tuition until March 11th, which would keep him in school until about two weeks before our Commencement week exercises.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.





My dear Madam:

In reply to your letter of recent date I must state that your son, Jesse Wofford, was not selected to return to the Ford Motor Company's factory in Detroit to continue with his work there because his record was not satisfactory when he was given a chance last summer. Since his return to Carlisle he has been indifferent and apparently unwilling the greater part of the time to conform to the rules of the school, and until he does show a better spirit he cannot expect to be shown any special favors. The places in the Ford Company's factory are the very choicest that can be offered boys of this school at this time and as a number of applicants whose conduct is above reproach are waiting for a chance you will readily see that Jesse has his own future in his own power.

The very few days he spent in school is another indication of his attitude toward the things that are worth while and that he should be anxious to use to his own advan-

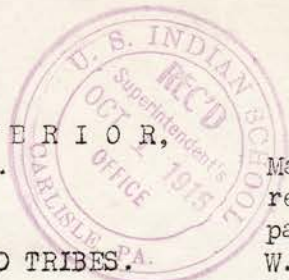

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Jesse Wofford, a $\frac{1}{2}$ blood Cherokee Indian, 22 years of age received his diploma for having completed the course at the Ford Factory.

During the past year Jesse earned \$787.10, spent \$453.15 and saved \$33.95. Supt. Parker reports that he has 10 acres of land.



I know nothing of a promise to either of these boys as they left Carlisle before I came and I have been connected in no way in correspondence with them.

Jesse Wofford would have graduated with the class of 1917 if he had remained here this year. He was very bright in his academic work, in fact one of the best of the class. There is no question but that he would have graduated.

Boyd Crowe was in the class of 1917 last year but failed of promotion and if he had ~~not~~ returned to the school this year would have been a Junior. The teachers say that his character was fine. His grades are poor. He is evidently a boy who works hard for what he gets but progresses slowly. He would not have graduated from Carlisle if he had returned this year and of course it seems to me that he could not be graduated at this time in view of the above circumstances. Yet it might be well to find out who promised these boys diplomas and trace the matter out in that direction before any action is taken.

I know nothing whatever of the Ford Course and I would want to know something about it before I should sign a diploma for them.
