

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mrs. Childers:

I am in receipt of your letter without date enclosing a draft on the National City Bank of Kansas City, Mo., in the sum of Twenty Dollars to be placed to the credit of Ruby and I enclose my official receipt therefor. ~~The Philadelphia trip~~ will cost about Ten Dollars, the Railroad fare, with the War Tax, for the round trip, amounting to about \$6.66. The admission to the game will be free, leaving the rest of the amount to pay for lunches and incidentals.

I am particularly glad that you wrote me about the matter of clothing for the girls. The same rules apply as in the General's time. We furnish uniforms and these uniforms are worn by the boys and girls on all formal occasions. The students wear their own clothing to school and work and it should not be expensive or elaborate. Some of the boys and girls have shown a disposition, however, to purchase expensive finery which they wear upon every occasion that it is not forbidden. In many cases this clothing has been sent by parents to pupils. From the standpoint of the school we consider it unnecessary. In certain cases, the matron has prohibited the use of dresses of girls where they are clearly unsuitable for a school. We try to stamp out a disposition to dress better than another. This is easily controlled so long as all funds, for the children, are deposited and expended under the supervision of the school authorities, but at times we are embarrassed in our efforts where parents send money or clothing directly to the children.

Ruby is a nice girl and is getting along fine. All she needs, outside of her uniform, is good sensible school clothing suitable for a girl of her age. If she requests you to give her expensive clothing, you need have no hesitation in refusing it because I assure you that her needs will be met by the school just as they were in your own time. I will be glad to urge upon Ruby economy in the use of her funds.

My brother has a friend there and his son was here two weeks ago and stayed several days with us. I want to give Ruby all the advantages that I can as it was given me but it takes money and it is hard to do much. I was very fortunate in getting the free trips that our very dear Capt. Pratt gave to some few of us on exhibition tours every once in a while.

I do hope Ruby is taking and using every opportunity that is afforded her. We have good school here at home but I will always contend that the eastern schools are superior to our home schools which was my reason for sending Ruby to your school.

I have another girl that I would like very much to have in your school before long. Another matter that I wanted to ask about was the clothes, are they required to furnish any special articles or not? We wore uniforms for all occasions when I was there but of course that was years ago and that times are much changed so I really wish to know.

We are enclosing herein a draft for twenty dollars please put to Ruby's credit and she must use sparingly as this is war times and money is scarce with us. I hope she is doing all in her studies. Please send receipt for the money as the court is so very strict on minor matters and oblige.
