
My Dear Mr Francis:

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Cross:

Reference is made to that part of your letter of April 17, 1917, that refers to the request of Clarence Cadotte who has spent \$75.00 since December 21, 1916, and your feeling that you do not desire to send him any more money at this time.

Clarence came to me today and it appears that he feels that he is seriously financially embarrassed, in view of the fact that he has had no money since the latter part of February. I read him your letter and pointed out to him that your position was absolutely correct, and that in view of the fact that the Government supplied him here with every necessity, he had no pressing need for money.

I have no knowledge of the financial resources of this boy but I presume he only has Chippewa payment money. At the

presen time the lad is absolutely without spending money.

If you feel ~~that~~ upon receipt of this statement of conditions here that you would be justified in sending him \$10.00 or less, to give him a reasonable amount of spending money for the rest of the year, I would be glad to see that it was given to him in such amounts as your knowledge of his resources would suggest.

If, however, you feel that he should have no money whatsoever, I will so advise him.

Sir:-

I am in receipt of your letter of the 9th inst written in behalf of Mrs. Isabella Cadotte, mother of Clarence Cadotte, who was graduated from this school in June 1918. You state that Mrs. Cadotte has sent three telegrams asking for the whereabouts of her son and has had only one answer.

This is to inform you that Clarence left the school to find work for himself immediately after graduation and his name was dropped from the school rolls when he did this. We were not informed by him where he was going. It was not until about two weeks ago, that we learned he was at Hog Island, Pennsylvania. His mother, I believe can reach him by addressing him there.

When we learned where he was, we informed the local ticket agent that he would not likely use the ticket placed there for his use and the agent tells me this morning, that the ticket was returned to the sender.

No one in authority here has knowledge of Clarence being at the school June 15th. If Ruby Childers and he met on that day, they did so without the knowledge and permission of any one in authority.


Gentlemen:
