## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE. -Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. ( 28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. ( 29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-
A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.
This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Reference is made to that part of your letter of April 17, 1917, that refers to the request of Clarence Cadotte who has spent \$75.00 since December 21, 1916, and your feeling that you do not desire to send him any more money at this time.

Clarence came to me today and it
appears that he feels that he is seriously financially embarrassed, in view of the fact that he has had no money since the latter part of February, I read him your letter and pointed out to him that your position was absolutely correct, and that in view of the fact that the Government supplied him here with every necessity, he had no pressing need for money.

I have no knowledged of the
financial resources of this boy but I presume he only has Chippewa payment money. At the
presen time the lad is absolutely without spending money.

If you feel that upon receipt of this statement of conditions here that you would be justified in sending him \(\$ 10.00\) or less, to give him a reasonable amount of spending money for the rest of the yoar. I would be gled to see that it was given to him in such amounts as your knowledge of his resources would suggest.

I an in receipt of your letter of the \(9 t h\) inst written in behalf of irs. Isabella Cadette, mother or clarence cadette, who was graduated from hats school in June 1918. You state that \(12 x \mathrm{~s}\). cadette has sent three telegrams asking tor the whereabouts of her son and has had only one asper.

This is to inform you that clarence aet the school to find work for himself immediately after graduation and his hame was dropped rom the school rolls when he did this. ye were not informed by him where he was going. It was not until about, two weeks ago, that we cleared he was at Hoc I gland, pennsylvania. His mother, I believe can reach him by addressing him there.

When we leaned where he was, we informed the local ticket's agent that he would not likely use the ticket placed there for his use and the agent tells me this mowing, that the ticket was resumed to the sender.

Wo one in authority here has knowledge of Clarence being at the school June 15 th. If Ruby childers and he ret on that day, they did so without the knowledge and permission of any one in authority.

I am writing in behalf of irs. Isabella Cadotte, mother of Clarence ßarl Cadotte, who entered yourcollege about three years ago, and who finished his school course in June of this year, and it is for the following information.

It was Mrs. Cadotte's wish that her son return home immediately upon graduation, and for that reason on June 6 , wired his transportation plus \(\$ 5.00\) to her son Clarence, which he should have received no later than the morning of June 7 . Not having heard from him at all, on the 14 th day of June she wired the College asking of his whereabouts. On the morning of the 15 th she received a message stating that "Party left school. No address." A second message was sent you and a third by the Telegraph Co. Agent of the same question the first part of the last week in June to which no answers have been received.
