Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Grace Maybee, a $\frac{1}{4}$ blood Seneca Indian, 22 years of age, if she passes her examinations, on June 6, 1918, will be graduated from this school in the Nursing course, in accordance with the tentative course of study.

Grace's father died when she was seven years old, at which time she left home and went to live with her grandmother. She is the third girl of a family of four, two of whom attended Carlisle before her.

Grace has been under the jurisdiction of Carlisle for ten years. She comes from New York and has no land or property under the jurisdiction of the Government.

Mrs. Matilda G. Ewing, Matron, reports that Grace has initiative, is pleasant, honorable, industrious. She thinks she will be loyal and true to the profession she has chosen. She considers her tactful and energetic and that she makes friends readily.

Principal Blair reports that Grace is of the happy-go-lucky type. He considers her thoroughly good and honest but rather loud and very talkative. She likes to do things her own way but is not arbitrary or difficult to manage. He considers her capable in academic branches, dependable, and he believes she is capable of managing her own affairs.

Grace is a strong, healthy girl. Arrangements have been made for her to become a graduate nurse, taking her training in the Jefferson Hospital in Philadelphia. To my mind, she is a splendid girl, a hard worker and should be a success as a nurse by reason of her disposition.

Most of the money that Grace has had, she has made on the outing, and has expended it freely but not extravagantly. She has no property under the jurisdiction of the Government. I would recommend that a certificate of competency be issued in her case.

LY LETTER TO OUR PEOPLE

April 13, 1917

Grace Maybe.
A COUNTRY GIRL'S HOME LETTER.

My dear Mother:—Since the last time I wrote you I have had a visitor, Miss Johnston from the Carlisle Indian School, I was surprised and very glad to see her. I have also learned how to crochet a camisole top, but I have not completed one yet—probably it will be some time.

The news in general now is war. Four of our boys in the senior class enlisted and the company they joined was called out to Trenton last Friday. Our principal let the school out a few minutes before twelve so we could see the company and show them our respects. The boys who joined were the best athletes in the high school this year, so our baseball team will be crippled.

This morning in school we sang "The Star Spangled Banner" and then saluted "Old Glory." There was one girl who would not do it because her father is a German. She seemed to be proud of it, too. But it was very hard for some of the girls to keep from saying things to her. I wear a little silk flag all the time now, and if anybody should try to take it from me I pity the person, because it does not make any difference what the United States does, it is my country and my flag.

We have been house cleaning, but are getting nearly through, at least with the worst part.

Today the second year agriculture class had a lecture given on gardening. Some points which the speaker brought out were very helpful. Our class had to take down notes. Tomorrow I suppose we will be asked questions.

I will close by wishing you a joyous Easter.


