Replying to your letter, relative to Gors LaBlanc, I have to report that Gora has been under the Outing since last April. She worked for wages until the first of September, then she started to go to school. From her summer wages she caved Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00), which was placed to her account here. During the winter months she has drawn all but Three dollars, fifty-five cents (\$5.55) of this amount.

She does not earn very big wages, but she is in a good home where training and kind treatment counts for more than money, in my estimation.

It is not necessary that she have money to spend for clothing as the school furnishes the Cuting Publis all that they need in this line. Our girls. like all other girls, like to have a little spending money now and then. If her mother can affored to send her a dollar or so at a time for incidentals, I am sure Cora will appreciate it, but as I stated before she does not need a large a mount of money.

The outing management is planning to transfer Cora June first to another home where she will be able to earn more as she is more experienced now and able to earn more.

The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservations, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservations. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservations school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.
