## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.





My dear Sir:

Referring to your letter of the 16, inst. relative to the advisability of Meroney French returning to this reservation to take care of his mother who has been recently deserted by her husband, I will say that I do not think there is any good reason for Meroney returning to the reservation at this time. It is true that his mother's husband has left her and I think that she is the better off by his having done so. Should Meronev return to Cherokee he would have no home to go to and he would be a hinderance to his mother rather than a help. His little sister has been put in school at Cherokee and his mother is free to go wherever she pleases. I am sure that she can find a home during the winter where she will be well cared for. I trust that you will tell Meroney for me that I think it best for him to remain at his Country Home during the winter where he will have opportunity to improve himself. The Cherokee reservation is no place for a boy without a home.



I was born, December 15, 1898, at Cherokee, North Carolina. My father, William French, deserted my mother and six children.

I being the oldest of the boys managed to help my mother to overcome difficulties and help rear the other children.

I began school when I was ten years old by entering the Cherokee School.

It was a difficult proposition for me to get used to school life. I deserted four or five times, and thereby lost two years of schooling, which I regretteddas I grew older.

I finally returned to the same school with a determination to make good in which resolution have been successful so far. In the latter part of 1911, I had the opportunity of filling out an application to enter Carlisle. I felt that was the chance to prepare myself for the right kind of career, and now I am looking forward to the end when I shall have earned the diploma that will tell the worl that I am a graduate of Carlisle.

July 11, 1917. Mr. Meroney French. c/o Mr. R. H. Butler, Newtown, Penna. Dear Meroney: The receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 10, 1917, regarding your enlistment in the 6th Permsylvania Infantry. In response you are advised that you are of an age where if you feel it is your patriotic duty to enlist, I would raise no objection. I have always urged the students of this school, who desired to enlist, to go in the regular Army or Navy of the United Stated rather than in the State Militia. My reason for this is that the State Militia is peculiarly desirable because it brings together, in the same command, men from the same neighborhood. You Indian boys have no large acquaintance in this State, but the Federal Government has paid for your education and would seem to have a greater call upon your services than the State authorities. However, this is a personal matter with you. In regard to your obtaining a diploma from this school, were you within a few months of graduating I would willingly arrange to give you a diploma. However, as you have done no work in the senior year it would be impossible to graduate you. In connection with the entire matter

however, you should bear in mind that you have really entered into an agreement with your country father to serve him until the end of the summer. I would suggest that you must be guided by your own conscience. If you are enlisting from the spirit of patricism and an honest desire to serve your country. I say go ahead and God bless you. If, on the other hand, you are enlisting as a means to break your agreement with your country father and in a spirit of boyishnes seeking for a change, you are not living up to the standards of the flag and a poor citizen makes a poor soldier. You have come to cross roads where you must pick your own way: I cannot decide for you. I can only urge you to be sure of your motive and if you enlist stand by your selection and make good .

#### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservations, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservations. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided*, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservations school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Mr. Francis:

I have your letter of February 11, 1918, calling for information in regard to the property held by Meroni French, a pupil of your school, from this reservation, who will probably graduate this spring.

The Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians have not been allotted and Meroni has no land of his own. The Eastern Cherokees have about 63,000 acres of land, which they hold as tenants in common. When the land is allotted it is probable that Meroni will receive about 70 acres of mountain land, worth about \$1000. His pro rata share from funds in trust will probably amount o about \$75.00. As to when this fund will be paid or allotment will be made I am unable to say.

Meroni has \$91.44 on deposit in the bank under my supervision.
