INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

I take pleasure in submitting below a copy of the reply that was addressed to me yesterday by our school Physician:

"In regard to George Miller I am glad to say that he has merely an attack of common cold (acute bronchitis), for which he has been receiving treatment.

He has at no time shown any signs of tuberculosis and is steadily gaining weight. My records show that in September of last year he weighed 136½ lbs., while in December his weight increased to 153 lbs. It seems that Mrs. Dodge has been entirely misinformed."

My Dear Mr. Friedman:- I am writing to you in regard to my brother Georgie Miller, some one wrote to my folks and told them that he was going to be sent back to his folks on account of consumption. While I hardly believe that the report is true, I thot that I would write and find out the truth. If there is any indication of such trouble , I can arrange for him to go to a school where the air is drier etc like Phoenix, Arizona. I am very anxious to hear from you so that I will know what to tell our folks.

I just got a letter from George the other day and he did speak of a slight cold in the head, that was all, he spoke so well of every thing, his plans in the future and all. I hope that there is nothing in the report. If there is any sign of consumption on the boy ,let me know before it is too late.

We are having a fine winter here for South Dakota, every one says it is unusual for this state. We are in hopes that this weather will keep up all winter.

We are busy, the end of the quarter, this agency work has a lot to it then.

Now Mr. Friedman please let me know just how my brother is, I can tell the folks in a different way from what any one else can. He is their baby and it would just break their hearts if it came to them that he was being sent to them on account of consumption.

My dear Mrs. Dodge:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your favor of April the 18th, in which you make inquiry regarding the condition of your brother, George Miller. When your letter came to me this morning I referred it to our School Physician with a request that he make me a definite statement. I submit it below for your information:

"In answer to this say that George has an incipient tuberculosis. He was looking better shortly before his departure and had also gained slightly. It is probable that he will make a good recovery, but it was not considered to his best interests to keep him here."

I will add to this that George did not look at all sick when he left here, so that he will have a splendid chance to regain his strength if he exercises care in forming his habits.

I am pleased to know that you and Mr. Dodge are doing so well at the Sisseton Agency, and I would thank you

My Dear Mr.Lipps;- I have just received a letter from my youngest brother George Miller there at Carlisle saying that he was being sent home on account of ill health.What is the nature of his illness? I am asking this so that we may know what to do in regard to him. If it is lung trouble probably one of these schools like Toledo or Phoenix would help him. Every one in our family has had that weakness while growing. After we have attained our growth we seem to outgrow it. George is so young and has grown so fast that I have an idea that he will get stronger if he goes to a dryer climate.

I wrote to Mr.Friedman in regard to George and they wrote to me and said that he was perfectly sound and quoted even the doctors report in regard to him. My father and mother are both old and it falls to us older ones to look out for the younger ones.

We are doing fine in our work here, I can not say that I like Office work as well as other work. We do all the Finance work and you know what that means on a large reservation. I assist Mr.Dodge,I keep all the Individual Indian accounts, he does the more responsible part of the work of course.

We will have to look out for a place where we can send our little girl to school and yet have her near us. She has missed one year of school already and unless we get a transfer to a more desirable place I am afraid she will miss another year. There is a school (district) about two miles and a half from here, it is such a distance to send a child in the winter time and it is winter here most of the time.

I suppose Carlisle is beautiful now, our spring has not fully started here, every thing seems brown and asleep yet. Even the creeks are not thawed out yet, the only signs of spring we see are the wild duck and geese traveling northward.

If I am not asking too much I would like to know about George.
