## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his use, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.*—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.



Referring to your communication of the 10th, inst., relative to the enrollment of Isaac Longshore, etc., I wish to advise that there was an error made in the preparation of the application of Annie Longshore for the enrollment of her son in your institution. Annie Longshore is the daughter of Indian parents, her father being a half-blood Sac and Fox and her mother a full-blood Cherokee.

Inclosed herewith you will please find an affidavit of the applicant showing the degree of Indian blood of her parents. You are also requested to return both copies of the application to this office for correction. These will be returned at the earliest possible date, or new ones prepared and forwarded instead.


I am also returning the expense voucher with the request that you reconsider same. This pupil has no funds to his credit and there is no prospect at this time of his ever having an account at this office. The mother is badly in debt and unable to settle the amount. During the past season we transferred several children to other schools and provided for their subsistence enroute. This avoids the neces-

sity of an employee accompanying them and useless expenditure of greater amounts. Of course, where the pupil has funds or the parents have provided for the expense of the trip no expense is incurred by this office. The furnishing of subsistence for the pupils enroute has never been questioned by other Superintendents and I believe that on reconsideration you will conclude to allow this claim.

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of January the 7th, with which you submitted an expense account for an amount of \$5.35, an indebtedness which was incurred by your financial clerk in starting Isaac Longshore for Carlisle. Replying thereto I have to advise that it is usually required that students pay for such expenses from their own funds and the papers are being returned to you.

I also have to call attention to the fact that the application you submitted to cover the transfer of the young man establishes claim to but 3/16 degree of Indian blood and under existing Regulations his eligibility for enrolment will have to be passed on by the Office at Washington before his enrolment here can be finally effected. As all the facts in the case are known to you it is believed that the request for authority to complete the transfer should be submitted to the Office by you.

My dear Madam:

I thank you for your letter of January the 11th, in which you spoke so frankly about your son Isaac who is now enrolled at this school. In reply I must advise that Isaac has really improved in many respects since he came to Carlisle and that the very close watch that has been kept over him has resulted in making him a much better boy. He has not been intoxicated during the time he has been enrolled here and as far as it is known he has not touched liquor of any kind.

Regarding the small amount of money you admit sending direct to him every month I must advise that you should not do so except thru this office. We will then know when Isaac has money and just how much and it will make it far easier for us to co-operate with you in giving your son the care you desire he shall have. The amount of \$9.00 he claims he must have should not be sent to him because he is given all the clothes he will need.

If you desire that your son shall continue with his school work at Carlisle until the period of his enrolment has terminated you should not promise him that he may return home for the summer months. If he conducts himself as he has done and desires to do so he will have an opportunity to earn money for himself under our Outing System, and that will then not necessitate your denying yourself in order that he can have a little money from time to time.

Hoping that you will assure me by return mail that you will not continue to send money to Isaac except thru this office and that other favorable reports can be conveyed to you regarding him and the progress he is making in his work and studies here, I am,

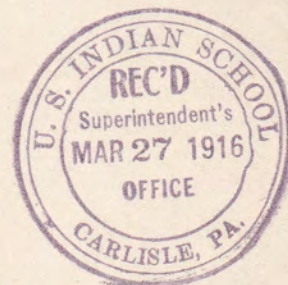


