## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.*



## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

This in a way is characteristic of pneumonia just preceding the crisis yet I would hesitate to prognosticate a safe outcome with the boy as ill as he is this morning. My dear Mr. Kelsey:

I have your letter of March second in reference to the death of Oscar Derrisaw and the illness of Seeley Alexander. You desire an expression of my views as to the cause of so much pneumonia among the Creek pupils at this school. In reply I have to advise that this matter has given me considerable concern, and I have talked to the physician and the nurse about it and the only cause to which they are able to attribute the trouble is the very severe and almost unprecedented weather which had prevailed in this section of the country during the past three weeks. Superintendent Allen was here over Sunday recently and he told me that during the three years he was at Carlisle, he never saw any such weather, as we were having here at the time of his visit. It appears that the lungs of these boys are very weak and the least cold appears to affect them.

I realise fully what this unfortunate circumstance means to you in your efforts to get those people out of the clutches of the grafters, and I have done everything in my power during my short time here to

prevent these boys from getting sick. I am giving them my personal attention and have spared no expense in providing them with the best medical service obtainable, and we have one trained nurse and five or six student nurses looking after Seeley Alexander at this time. We have also called into consultation Dr. Allen, of Carlisle, who is considered one of the best practitioners in this section of the country. The weather we have been having has been particularly good pneumonia weather, and no doubt this has been the prime cause of the trouble. Otherwise the health of the school here has been excellent.

Seeley Alexander will probably pass the critical point tomorrow or the next day, and as yet we cannot say definitely what the outcome will be. We are doing everything in our power for him.



Mr. Meyer: I wish to report that Oscar Deersaw, deceased, was admitted to the hospital on ~~S~~aturday the 21st, at which time the diagnosis of pneumonia was made. His condition the first few days was good and consequently his recovery was reasonably expected. On ~~Thurs~~day, however, his condition became rapidly worse, his heart action and his breathing causing me great alarm. On Friday morning the complication, pulmonary oedema, which caused his death set in. This is always an exceedingly dangerous complication. Two physicians, Dr. Allen of Carlisle and Dr. McAllister of Harrisburg were called in consultation but could do little toward arresting the condition.

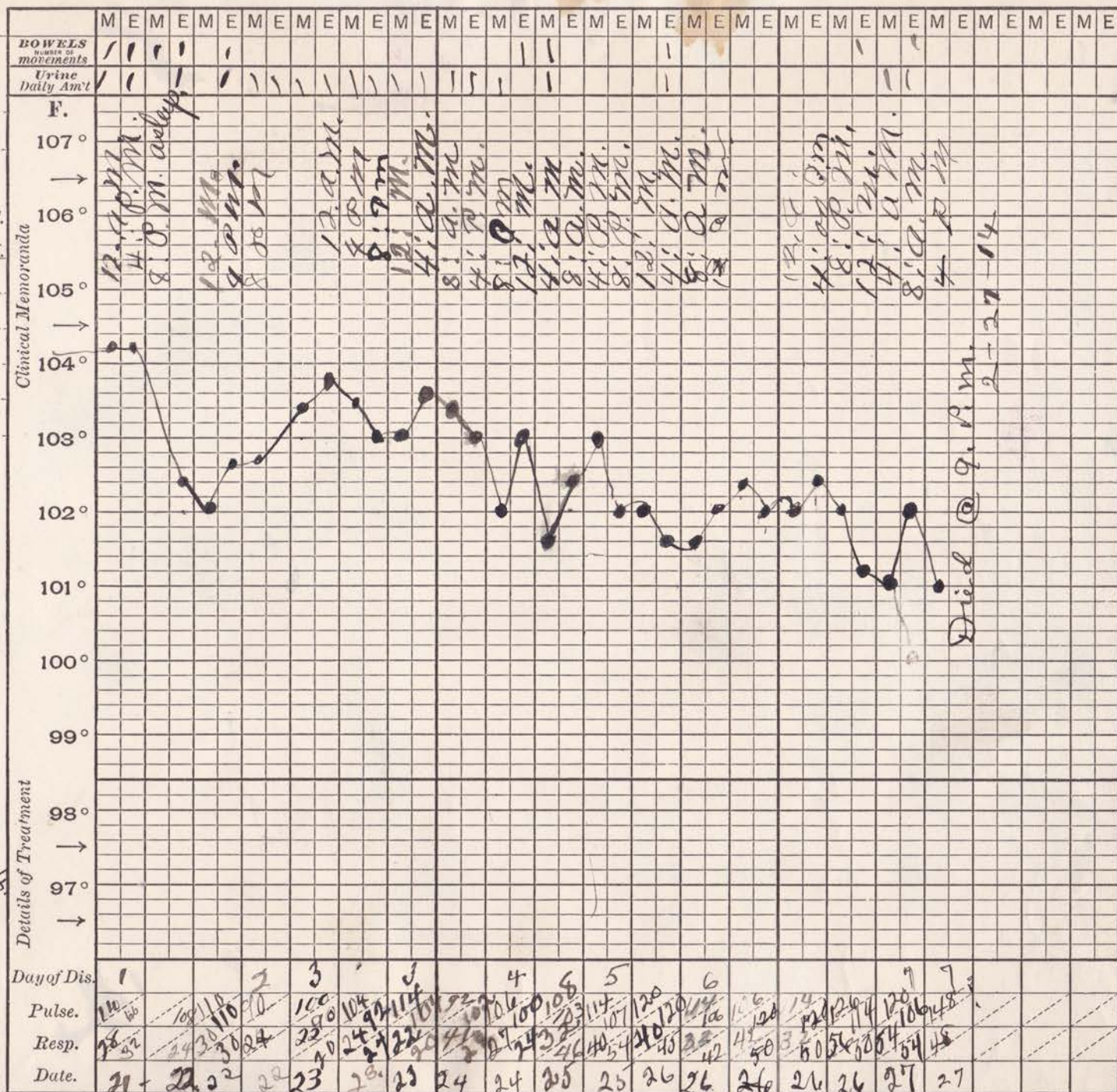
