Dear Sir:

In regard to the last illness and death of your son, Thomas Cole, would state that during the last year, previous to his death, he was in very poor mental condition. He was unable during this entire period to carry on an intelligent correspondence and at times was unable to make his wants known. At the best he only spoke short sentences which had no particular meaning. He never spoke of his relatives nor did he inquire as to when he might go home.

He had been afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis for some months previous to his death and received treatment in our new male pavilion for tubercular patients. While here he showed some improvement physically but continued to fail mentally.


His pneumonia followed a series of seizures which lasted about six days. For the last forty-eight hours previous to his death, he was unconscious but apparently suffered no pain. He received the last rites of the Church by our resident priest, who frequently visited him during his
