

X OBITUARY—ANALLA X

Last Friday morning came the sad news that Walter K. Analla had passed away the evening before at nine o'clock of pneumonia by which he had been confined to his bed only a few days. Almost to the last hopes were entertained for his recovery and when the announcement came that he was dead it was received with much surprise and profound sorrow. That so good a husband and father and such an exemplary citizen and christian should be so suddenly called away in the prime of life is a mystery to the wisest of earth, and is known only to the Divine mind. The deceased leaves a wife, four daughters a son, a mother, a sister and a brother to mourn his loss.

He took the farm on which he resided as a homestead and had a very fine home and other property and was in comfortable circumstances. He was one of our best known men and a most exemplary citizen and christian.

omit Walter K. Analla was born Oct. 16, 1866 at Laguna, New Mexico and on July 19, 1906 was married to Miss Elizabeth Young an educated lady of exemplary character and who had been a teacher in the public schools of this county.

Since their marriage they have resided on the farm three miles south west of Wagner where the deceased departed from this life on the night of Dec. 21, 1916, aged 50 years, 2 months and 5 days.

On the 16th of Dec. he was taken sick with pneumonia and every thing possible was done to effect his recovery but all to no avail and he gradually grew worse to the end.

In the spring of 1907 the deceased was connected with the Wagner Congregational Church by letter and remained a faithful, working and exemplary member to the end.

During nearly the whole time he held membership here he was an officer of the Church and always with the utmost fidelity to duty.

To know him was to love him, and every one was his friend and he will be sadly missed in church and social circles throughout this community.

X His funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. W. Wilson at the Congregational Church of Wagner on Sunday Dec. 24 at 2 p. m. The text being Luke 22nd Chapter and 42nd verse. "Not my will but thine be done." Rev. Wilson said he was not merely a member but he was more for he was an active working member and he could tell by the grip of his hand and his actions, that he had the true Christian spirit.

As you have no doubt noticed the last issue of The Arrow was a combination issue of The Arrow and Red Man, the two publications which have heretofore been published at the Carlisle Indian School.

Owing to the increased cost of all supplies for the school and particularly of all materials going into the make-up of a newspaper or magazine, it has been deemed advisable to continue The Arrow as heretofore but to combine the issue, on the first week of the month, with The Red Man under the caption, The Carlisle Arrow and Red Man.

The material usually found in The Arrow will be in the combined issue, together with such other leading articles and information as may be collected of interest to Indians, Indian Service employees, and other friends and well-wishers of the Indian race.

The regular subscription price will be One Dollar a year payable in advance, but to all ex-students of the school a special rate of Fifty Cents a year is made. This is within the reach of every one.

Carlisle is your school. Its continued success reflects yours. It has given to you of its best. As a further evidence of its interest in you, you are offered the privilege of becoming a paid subscriber, at the reduced rate, to the paper and magazine that will come to you each week during the school year bearing welcome news of your beloved school.

You need The Arrow, and The Arrow needs you. Every loyal ex-Student should keep in touch with his school. This is your opportunity. Be true to your colors.

It will be our endeavor to make the new magazine issue newsy, interesting, and instructive, and we hope the change will be to your liking.

With the issue of October 26th, all free subscriptions will be dropped. Use enclosed card for mailing your fifty cents.

Walter Analla died last Dec. 21, 1916. At the time I sent a notice to Carlisle, thinking you would be interested to know about former students. Walter loved Carlisle and Gen. Pratt and never tired telling me

about his good times while at Carlisle. He had pneumonia and was only sick in bed six days. He was a good Christian man and a good worker and we have one of the most beautiful places in this country. I would be proud to have any of the Carlisle exstudents, when near, to call and see Walter's home. I had a nice vault built and Walter with our little son Irving are sleeping there. The first vault for an Indian on this reservation, that I know of. I tell you all this that you may know Walter's time at Carlisle was well spent. His only wish was that he could have gone to some college before settling down for his life work. Of course now that he is gone and I never was at Carlisle, the little paper does not mean so much to me. I am an Indian (Sioux) and all matters relating to ^{the} betterment of Indians, I keep at heart. Am taking several Indian school papers and am sorry but think I cannot keep on with the Arrow and Red man.
