Gentlemen:

A young man at this school by the name of Joseph M. Jocks, who is attending the Carlisle Indian School as a student, suffered an accident in New York City on Washington's Birthday a year ago. The accident was caused by a falling sign belonging to the Marcus Lowe Theatrical Enterprise Company.

I understand from this young man that the matter was finally settled through attorney Reed L. Carr by the Company allowing him \$300. This entire sum, as I understand, was placed in trust with your banking firm. Part of this money has already been utilized for medical expenses and attorneys fees.

This boy is in need of funds at this time for expenses in connection with his school work, and I am writing in his behalf to ask that any funds lawfully to his credit be sent to him. This money can either be sent direct to him here or to the Carlisle Indian School. The boy states further that the money was to be allowed him at the rate of \$6.00 per week, provided he attended school in New York City, and that any remainder was to be turned over to him when he was twenty-one years of age. He found it impossible to attend school

in New York City on the amount allowed, and having Indian blood was admitted to this school. He will be twenty-one years of age on May 12th, but as he is in the senior class here he needs funds for various purposes.

Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

INDIAN BRAVES DEFEAT HILLMEN

MT. WASHINGTON LOSES AT LACROSSE 3 TO 2.

In Pretty Game Locals Lead for the First Half, But Stamina and Luck Enable the Red Men to Turn Tables in Second Session—Sensational Plays Stir Gallery—Hillmen Juniors Lose.

Pop Warner's Indian Braves, from the Carlisle School, in one of the prettiest and best-contested lacrosse games of the local season, yesterday defeated the strong Mt. Washington Club team on the latter's grounds by the close score of 3 goals to 2. Mt. Washington had the Indians bested at the close of the first half, with the score standing 2 to 1 in favor of the Hillmen, but the red men came back stronger in the second half, and fast running, combined with stamina and a degree of luck which turned in their favor, enabled them to get two more tallies, while holding the Hillmen down to a blank in this second session.

The game was a beautiful exhibition of stick work, passing the ball and catching the ball and running on the part of both teams, and it was no disgrace to the Hillmen to lose so close a contest, although the latter were anxious to wipe out the memory of their defeat by the Indians last year.

Every goal scored during the day was of a sensational order and aroused the enthusiasm of the spectators. Mt. Washington led off by Gordon Armstrong beating his way in upon the Indian goal by the prettiest kind of dodging and slamming a hard one past the red goal-keeper. Frankie Lamotte followed this up not long after with another pretty bit of work and scored. Toward the close of the half Jocks got the ball on a pretty run in front of the Hillmen's goal, after a general mix-up of shots, and slipped the ball into the net.

In the second half Jocks got another tally. The Hillmen midfield made stronger effort to get down on the Indian goal and the Indians returned the compliment. In consequence Jocks got another chance and Briscoe, on an error of judgment, expecting the shot to be a pass to another close attack, left his goal and the ball reached the net. Jacobs soon after made a beautiful play while standing close to the crease, by catching the ball on a close pass and shooting it backwards for the third goal and victory. The game ended soon afterwards.

Mount Washington also lost another hard battle in the defeat of the Mount Washington second team by the Baltimore City College, by 3 to 2, the same score as in the senior game. This contest was for the junior city championship, and for individual medals presented by the Baltimore Lacrosse League. The collegians got a lead of two goals to 0 in the first half and although Mount Washington came back in the second half and secured two goals, the college also secured another tally and won. Fenimore Baker and Chick Moore shot the goals for Mount Washington, while Knipp made two for the City College and Wolf scored one.

We shall remember with pleasure how he sang, "The Little Grey Home in the West," at Commencement time. His graceful presence and gentlemanly bearing upon all occasions will also be an ever pleasant memory to those who had the pleasure of knowing him while he was a student at Carlisle.



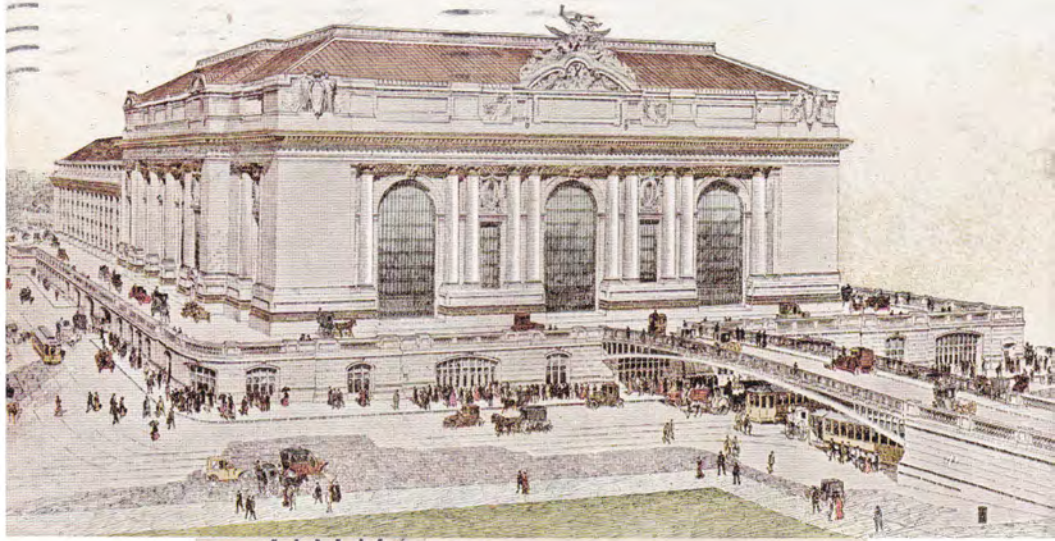

REDSKINS BY A POINT

Mount Washington Loses Fast Lacrosse Game By 3 To 2.

YOUNG SQUAWS SEE BATTLE

Throngs Line Field To Cheer Local Boys To Victory—Redskins Were Too Swift.

Remarkable swiftness and endurance were displayed by the Carlisle Indian School lacrosse team and the Redskins defeated the Mount Washington twelve on the Mount Washington grounds yesterday, 10 to 2.

Brilliant teamwork and passing marked the playing of both teams and in these departments the local men equaled their opponents. The game was nip and tuck throughout and as exciting as any yet played on the local field. From the opening of the game to the end the Indians outwitted the Hillmen in passing. The Indians never hold the ball in their sticks unless it is absolutely necessary.

A large crowd saw the game. The enthusiasm shown reminded one of the old Mount Washington cricket games. The side lines on both sides of the field were thronged, and the clubhouse was taxed to its capacity.

The sticks used by the Indians, according to Coach O'Neill, were made by hand. The players do not like the manufactured ones and make their own at their school. When they have shaped the wood Indian women weave in the catgut nets and tying on two red and yellow ribbons they send their braves out to victory. Several Indian maidens accompanied the team to see the game.

Armstrong evened the score by scoring on a pass from Lamb. Not long afterward Hudgins made a beautiful run in to the Carlisle goal from midfield. He came in at a fast pace and dodged two Indians. Frankie LaMotte met him at the goal, and a quick pass from Hudgins to LaMotte relayed the ball in the net. This score remained unaltered until the end of the half. The Indians tightened up, and soon their endurance began to tell on the Hillmen. Some of the local players became fatigued from following the fast pace set by the visitors, and did not play with as much spirit.

Swift passing and dodging were tried by the Indians, and on several occasions they came very near getting past the Mount Washington defense to score. Dr. Stonecipher checked these attempts. The half finished with the Indians on the defensive.

At the race off in the second half the Indians took the ball from the local players and tried hard to get beyond Dr. Stonecipher's barrier.

The second half went along in this manner until there was but one minute of play left. Coach O'Neill announced this fact to his players, and then they spurred. Young Deer made a long run downfield and passed to Long John. He relayed the ball to Jacobs, and the game ended with Jacobs scoring for the Indians. The line-up:
