I am a graduate nurse. I received my training from the M. E. Hospital in Philadelphia in 1894. Nursing therefore is an art. The importance of which can scarcely be over-estimated. It properly includes, as well as execution of specific orders, the administration of medicines, the personal care of the patient attention to the condition of the sick room.

A nurse has many ups and downs, most of my experience has been private nursing. A nurse needs to be especially patient, kind and gentle, for great demands are made upon her forbearance. To the doctor, the first duty is that of obedience, absolute fidelity to his orders. In private practice there is more room for the exercise of judgment. The nurse is a connecting link between doctor and patient, responsible to the one and for the other, and can do much to promote good feeling between them. In speaking of the relations between nurse and patient it should not be necessary to more than refer to the fact that a nurse occupies a position of trust. It is true, that your patients will be largely dependent upon you for society and that it is often difficult to produce conversation on demand, but it is certainly possible to be bright, cheerful and entertaining, without resorting to gossip, for your own sake it is advisable to go occasionally to places of amusement, to read recent books and to keep yourself posted. This will apply more particularly to the private nurse. In private nursing, a much

Indians are eligible for appointment as assistant matron or nurse where the salary exceeds \$300 a year after having passed appropriate non-competitive examinations.

If you will signify which position you prefer, the Office will ask that you be given a non-competitive examination to take place at Chetopa, Kansas, under the direction of the Post-master.

You should also fill out and return the enclosed application blank through the Superintendent of the Carlisle School, Pennsylvania, referring to your maiden name in order that the proper connection may be made with your record as a pupil of the Carlisle School.
